Population, Diversity & Housing

- Population is a challenge in Lowndes County and across the region, according to a recent Georgia Trend article². Almost no county is expected to grow in the region, and most are projected to see populations decline over the next decade and a half. An aging workforce is also a strain for communities trying to attract new business and industry. A 2019 State of the Region Report³, published by the Southern Georgia Regional Commission, notes that Lowndes County has the greatest overall population of residents age 65+ (12,619) in the 18-county region for which they collect data. Lowndes County's births (at nearly 12,000 from 2010-2017), however, far exceeded deaths (around 6,000 during the same timeframe).
- While diversity is increasing in the region (with nearly half of the
 municipalities being Minority-Majority), Lowndes County remains
 majority Caucasian/White, although only by a slim margin, also
 according to the 2019 State of the Region Report. A survey conducted
 by One Valdosta-Lowndes found, in fact, that racial equality and
 inclusion was a top concern among residents.
- The bulk of the housing in the Region is owner-occupied (63%) and the majority of the region is not cost-burdened (spending more than 30% of income on housing). Lowndes had the lowest home ownership rate of all counties at 52%. One-third of the population in the county also spend over 30% of their income on housing the highest rate in the region according to the State of the Region Report.
