Economics & Education

- According to the One Valdosta-Lowndes survey, top community strengths were seen as military presence; opportunities for higher education; connectivity location, traffic, and roadways; affordability; and education (public and private). In fact, the State of the Region Report stated that Wiregrass Georgia Technical College saw enrollment increase 66% since January 2018, totaling 5,810 as of 2019.
- Moody Air Force Base is crucial to the community, and keeping the base open is a priority. Maintaining a high quality of life for personnel remains a top goal for local Chambers of Commerce, according to the Georgia Trend article, as is ensuring the environment around the base is kept in good condition: addressing nearby blighted areas as well as protecting the base from encroaching development are ongoing goals.
- The Georgia Trend article reports that significant transportation
 infrastructure will be funded over the next 10 years thanks to
 the passage of the Transportation Investment Act (TIA), which began
 collecting a 1 percent sales tax last October. This will provide immediate
 and necessary financing for the construction of infrastructure, road
 projects, and bridges.
- Most respondents to the One Valdosta-Lowndes survey felt that the
 lack of jobs with upward mobility was the biggest challenge
 to retaining talent, while the biggest barriers for growth were
 lack of entertainment/recreation opportunities, lack of shared
 vision, and local governments not working together. Crime
 and safety, access to technical education, and quality of schools were
 indicated to be the smallest barriers to growth in the community.
- The respondents to the One Valdosta-Lowndes survey indicated that the
 top measurable goals for economic and community development should
 be supporting ongoing academic and skills improvement in
 public school systems and diversifying the economic tax base
 leading to the creation of new jobs and increased per capita income.

Quality of Place

 Improved quality of place assets such as parks, bike trails and more diverse entertainment options for residents of all ages were top priorities to those who participated in the One Valdosta-Lowndes survey.
