Section XX. In order to implement Specific Appropriation XXXX of the 2026-2027 General Appropriations Act, a county or municipal government may not adopt or enforce an ordinance that requires a distributor or retailer to establish battery collection sites or to collect or handle batteries and products containing batteries for off-site recycling or disposal until a study providing recommended practices for a distributor or retailer regarding the proper collection and handling of such has been produced. This section expires July 1, 2025.
