

- 10.2 Through a proceeding before the County's Code Enforcement Board and/or special magistrate as provided in part I of Chapter 162, Florida Statutes;
 - 10.3 Through a proceeding before the County Court as provided in part II of Chapter 162, Florida Statutes;
 - 10.4 Through a civil action in a court of competent jurisdiction pursuant to Chapter 86, Florida Statutes, Section 162.30, Florida Statutes, the common law or otherwise seeking declaratory action, temporary and/or permanent injunctive relief, civil penalties or otherwise. In any such civil action, should the County be the prevailing party, the County is entitled to recover all costs, including a reasonable attorney's fee, that it incurs in the civil action; or,
 - 10.5 By any other process permitted by law or equity.
- 11. Penalty. A person committing a violation of the temporary moratorium shall be guilty of an offense that, pursuant to Section 125.69, Florida Statutes, and any successor thereto, shall be prosecuted in the same manner as misdemeanors are prosecuted, and upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$500 or by imprisonment in the county jail, not to exceed 60 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
 - 12. Repeal of conflicting ordinances. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.
 - 13. Ordinance Not to Be Codified. This ordinance shall not be codified in the County's Code of Ordinances.
 - 14. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or provision of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not be construed to render the remaining provisions of this ordinance invalid or unconstitutional.
 - 15. Filing of Ordinance and Effective Date. In accordance with the provisions of Section 125.66, Florida Statutes, governing ordinances, a certified copy of this ordinance shall be filed with the Florida Department of State by the Clerk of the Board. This ordinance shall take effect upon filing with the Florida Department of State.

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
